Dear Representatives Eshoo and Lance:

The undersigned organizations committed to the health and wellbeing of mothers, infants, children and families endorse H.R. 2679, *the PREEMIE Reauthorization Act*, a bill to reauthorize Public Law 109-450, the PREEMIE Act.

Our nation's premature birth rate peaked at 12.8% in 2006, the year in which the PREEMIE Act was first passed. Since passage, however, premature birth rates have seen small but important declines in each subsequent year. The *PREEMIE Reauthorization Act* represents renewed federal support for our nation's efforts to reduce premature birth and builds upon the success of the original legislation. If enacted, the *PREEMIE Reauthorization Act* would capitalize on this momentum by enhancing federal research, ensuring greater federal collaboration, and promoting education and awareness of premature birth.

Premature birth is one of the most common, serious, and costly challenges facing our nation's health care system. Each year, nearly half a million babies are born too soon and struggle to survive. Many of those who do survive face a lifetime of serious health problems, including cerebral palsy, mental impairments, chronic lung disease, and vision and hearing loss. These health issues represent not only a tremendous challenge for the children affected, but also place a financial and emotional burden on many families. According to a 2006 Institute of Medicine (IOM) report, the annual societal cost associated with preterm birth is \$26.2 billion, or \$51,600 per infant born preterm.

The PREEMIE Reauthorization Act will continue our progress toward ensuring that all pregnancies are healthy and full term, and all infants as healthy as possible. We look forward to passage of this important reauthorization bill.
